**Note:**

*Aaron Clore and Eliza were not married. Eliza was probably a former slave. She is mentioned in Aaron's will as "faithful servant". Her children's race was usually listed as mullatto in census records while hers was black. The children may or may not be the children of Aaron Clore but in any case this family used the Clore surname.*

**The will of Aaron Clore was written 31 March 1871.**

“Wife Rosa Clore to have for her natural life the tract of 175 acres known as the lower or home tract whereon she resided and household and kitchen furniture in her possession, one milch cow, four killing hogs and one sow and pigs of her selection.

Son Aaron F. Clore to cultivate and superintend his mother's estate.

To Eliza and July, "colored women who have been my faithful servants, " 15 acres to be their home and the home of Jenny, daughter of Eliza, and after the death of Eliza and July to go to the then living descendants of Eliza per stripes [i.e. to be divided evenly]. After wife, Eliza to have second choice of one milch cow, 4 killing hogs, one sow and pigs and also two pieces of bacon, one barrel of corn and 1/2 barrel of flour.

Son Aaron F. Clore to hold \$150 in trust for Eliza, and \$50 each in trust for July; Jenny, daughter of Eliza; Pamily, daughter of Eliza; Champ, son of Eliza; children of Anna, widow of Eliza's son Lewis and Patty, daughter of Eliza. Both the principle and the interest were to be applied for their benefit as son Aaron F. determined to be best for them.

The remainder of the estate was to be sold and debts paid then residue to be equally divided between sons James W. Clore and Aaron F. Clore. James W. Clore's debts for which Aaron F. Clore was bound as surety were to be paid first out of James W. Clore's share before it was paid over to him. Son Aaron F. Clore was to have privilege of removed from t he 15 acres of Eliza 2/3 of all pines then standing.

Two bonds owed to son Aaron F. Clore to be paid in full before division of the estate.

James L. Kemper was appointed executor.

Witnesses were Jno. W. Taylor, J. E. Burke and James O. Wayland.

A codicil was added 1 July 1871 directing that a dwelling house was to be built for Eliza, July and Jenny on the 15 acres, not exceeding the cost of \$200 with other specifications given, under the direction of son Aaron F. Clore. Son Aaron F. Clore "in consideration of his services & attention to me during my long period of sickness and the services imposed upon him by my will" to be paid \$1000 before division of the estate.

Witnesses Jno W. Taylor and James O. Wayland.

A second codicil was added 7 August 1871. Servant woman Eliza was to hold the 15 acres and home in fee simple. July and Jenny were to be privileged to make it their home as long as they lived. The money mentioned above was not to be held in trust but to go directly to the parties mentioned, "to be their absolute property".

Witnesses Michael H. Utz and Jos. S. Miller.

A third codicil was added 7 August 1871. "Faithful servant Eliza for her constant attention to me in my sickness" to have one flax wheel, one cotton wheel and one common bed, bedstead and bedding and five barrels of corn out of growing crop.

Witnesses Michael H. Utz and Jose. S. Miller.

The will was exhibited at court by the executor James L. Kemper and recorded 25 August 1871. (Madison County, Virginia Will Book 14, p 171-175)
